Background: As the auspicious Year of the Dragon begins, the U.S. Postal Service

commemorates the Lunar New Year with a colorful new stamp. The Year of the

Dragon begins Feb. 10, 2024, and ends Jan. 28, 2025.

Parades, customary foods, and red and gold lanterns mark the Lunar New Year festival for people all over the world. Celebrants set off firecrackers to ward off evil spirits and clean their houses to signify a moment of renewal before spring. They write couplets, give gifts and prepare traditional meals to celebrate the

coming year.

People born in the Year of the Dragon are said to be successful, wise and powerful. In fact, many consider the dragon to be so favorable, they plan for children to be born under the sign. Every 12 years, many Asian communities experience a baby boom because of the allure of the dragon, the only mythical

creature in the Chinese zodiac.
